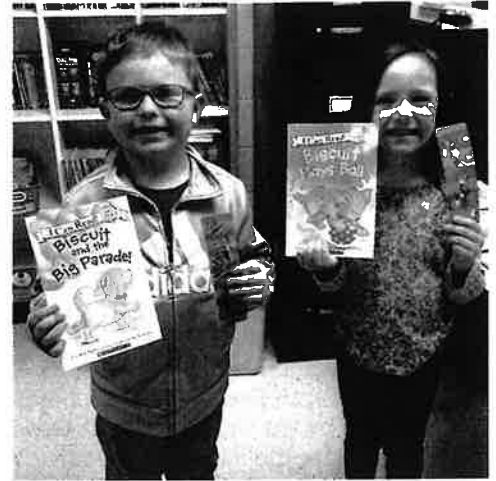

Read Across America Week



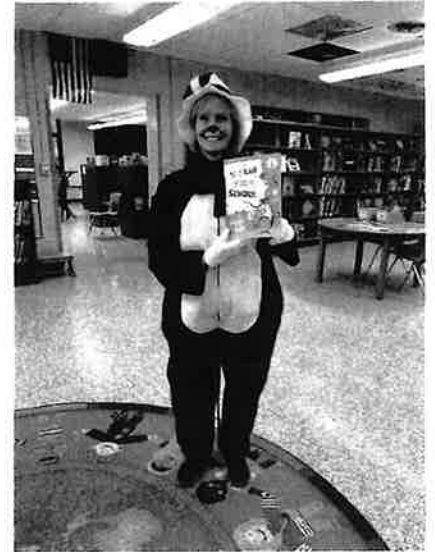

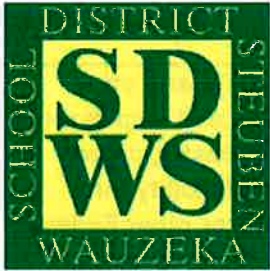
