How to Make a Snowflake out of Paper!

Fun fact: All snowflakes have 6 sides!

Step 1 - Begin with a square piece of paper.

You can make a square out of a rectangular piece of paper by taking one corner and folding it down to make a triangle, and then cutting off the excess like shown.

Step 2 - Fold the paper in half diagonally

Step 5 - Fold One-Third again


Take the left side of the triangle and fold it over top of the right, try to make the lines match up like in the second picture!


