- Exciting News! Delta Dental approved a grant of \$2,800 our Hornet Elementary Toothbrushing Program. Elementary classes 4K-5th grade will be re-implementing classroom toothbrushing very soon. Part of the grant dollars are funding UV sanitizers for the toothbrushes to provide better infection control as well as toothbrushes, fluoridated paste and other essential supplies. 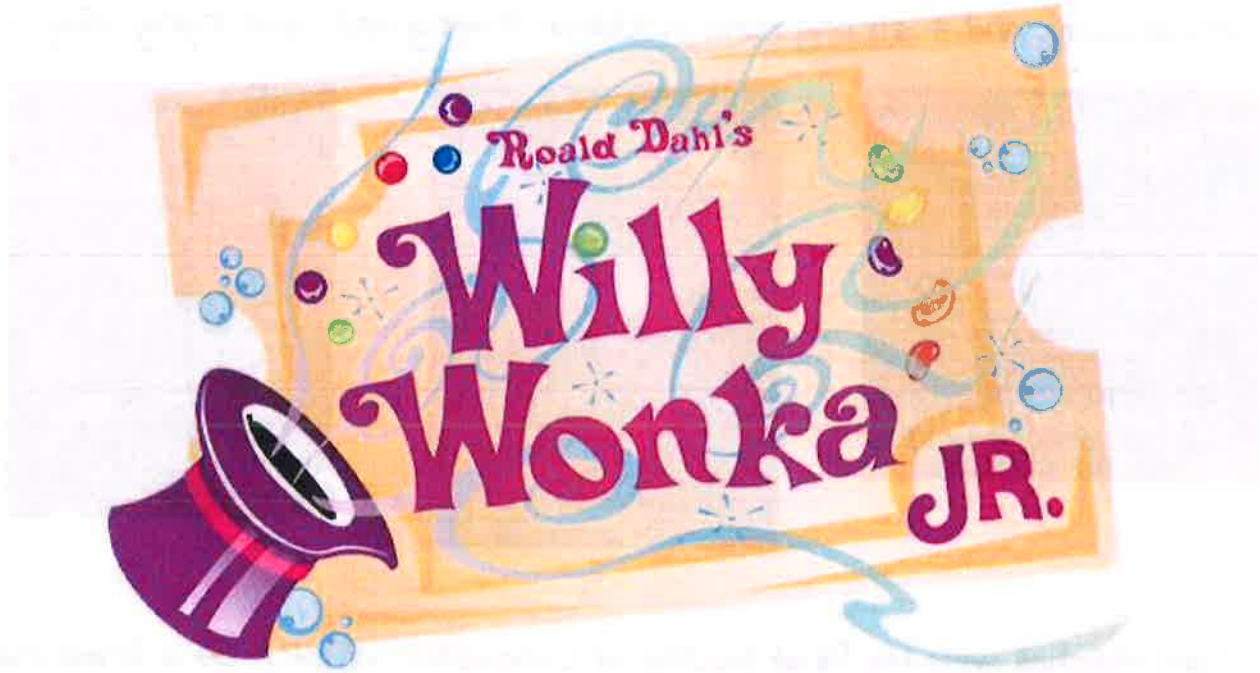

- In September 1882, the unions in New York decided to have a parade that celebrated their members that were in the unions, and to show them that they supported them.
- Labor day is the unofficial end of hotdog season.
- The holiday of Labor Day has evolved over the years. In the late 19th century, celebrations focused on holding parades in urban areas so they had stuff going on.
- 10,000 workers marched from the city hall all the way to 42nd street and then met up with their families for a picnic in Wendel's Park.
- The decision to make Labor Day on the first Monday in September was approved June 28, 1894.
- On June 28, 1894, president Grover Cleveland signed Labor Day into law.
- After New York held their parade other regions started having parades by 1887.



Blood Cancer Awareness Month



September is International Blood Cancer Awareness month. Blood Cancer Awareness month was created to support patients with blood cancer. Every 3 minutes someone in the U.S. is diagnosed with blood cancer.

There are three main types of blood cancer - leukemia, lymphoma, and myeloma. An estimate of 14,000 people are diagnosed with blood cancer in the U.S. About 16,000 people die of blood cancer each year. Although so many people die of blood cancer, the survival rate has gone up by 25% since the 1970s.

Blood cancer is still a great challenge even after chemo-therapy drugs were introduced in the 1950s. Prevention and early detection have always been a struggle in battling cancers, but x-rays and radiation therapy have helped battle this struggle. Advancements in technology and treatment since then have been helpful in finding the disease early.

Grandparents Day

History

In 1969, Russel Capper sent a letter to the president asking him to recognize a day to honor grandparents. Russel received the letter back stating that the president only issues special observances when congress authorizes him to do so.

Following that letter, Marien McQuade founded National Grandparents Day.

In 1977, Senator Randolph, along with other senators, sent a request to the president to issue annually a proclamation recognizing the first Sunday following Labor as Grandparent's Day.

On August 3, 1978, President Jimmy Carter signed the proclamation and the day was finally celebrated the following year.

- ★ Interview/Record family history

Mill Awareness

September 17th



September 17 is National Puppy Mill Awareness day. It is to encourage people who want or are looking for a dog, to adopt instead of shopping for them. The 17th of September is to give an insight into the cruel conditions that happen to dogs and puppies in these puppy mills. The breeders of these puppy mills do not care about the health of the puppies, they ignore the basic needs of them. They are taken from their mother and put into a small, dark, and dirty cage. The female dog can't move or play, they just have to perform the role of giving birth, so they can sell more puppies and get more money in their pockets.

Puppy mills have been around since after World War II. This is because after the war ended, thousands of families were suffering due to crop failure. This made it difficult to have enough money to support a family. So typical farmers would breed their dogs and sell the puppies. This is how the puppy mills started. Moreover, purebred dogs were in high demand for people in the suburbs. This is the only way people knew how to support their family after the loss of their crops. The puppy mills were so successful that the USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) started to promote them.

Today there are about 2,000- 3,000 federally licensed commercial breeding facilities by USDA in the USA. Fortunately the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS), has stopped around 176,088 dogs that were kept for breeding that are licensed by USDA and approximately 2.15 million puppies are sold each year.

Ways to support puppy mill awareness day

1. Adopt a dog from your local animal shelter.
2. You could also donate to help the ones who are suffering.
3. Or organize a fundraiser or a charity event to raise money.

National Suicide Prevention Week

Suicide prevention week was September 4th-September 10th. It is to spread awareness to the world about it. Suicide is the leading cause of death by people injuring themselves with the intent to die. There are many factors that lead to suicide such as people who have experienced violence like bullying, child abuse, neglect, or sexual violence. Any sexual violence has a higher risk because of the flashbacks and trauma.

Suicide rates increased by 30% between 2000-2018 and declined in 2019 and 2020. In 2020 the United States had the highest number of deaths with 45,979 just in 2020. Suicide its self is among the top 9 leading causes of death for people between the ages of 10-64. It was the second leading cause of death for people ages 10-14 and 25-34.

Suicide also hits bigger groups like race, ethnicity, age, and other factors like where people lived. Groups with the highest rates were non-hispanic, American, Indian/Alaska Native and non- hispanic white populations. Other groups with high rates are veterans, people who live in rural areas, and workers in certain industries and occupations such as mining and construction.

The groups that have a high rate in suicidal thoughts and behavior are the younger people who identify as lesbian, gay, or bisexual compared to their peers who identify as heterosexual. Attempts and suicide can cause serious emotional, physical, and and economic impacts. Those that attempt and survive may experience serious injuries that cause long term effects.

Suicide is preventable and everyone has a role to play in saving lives and create a healthy and strong individuals, families and communities. Prevention requires a comprehensive public health approach.

9/11 Memorial

On September 11, 2001 the Twin Towers and The World Trade Center were attacked. This Catastrophic Event would leave thousands injured, killed and trapped near the 80th floor of the 110 floor skyscraper. With many people in disbelief, and terror about what might happen next, 18 minutes later the second tower was hit near the 60th floor. A total of 2,996 people were killed in the 9/11 attacks. To this day we are still remembering all of the brave heroes, firefighters, police officers, citizens and even passengers that risked their lives for others.



Citizens of the United States gather every year on September 11 to take a moment of silence for those who died, and for those who died trying to save lives.

Today millions of people visit the memorial that is placed where the towers once stood.

The memorial in New York is a museum of items that were found at ground zero. Someday hope to get to see the museum, as well as the Memorial Falls, which is a waterfall with the names of all those that died that day all around it.

The Pentagon

As millions of citizens watched the terrible events unfolding in New York, Flight 77 lost



control in the air before crashing into the west side of the Pentagon military headquarters shortly after the towers were hit. Jet fuel from the plane caused a devastating explosion that led to the structural collapse of a portion of the giant concrete building. 125 military civilians were killed in the Pentagon, along with all 64 people aboard the airliner.

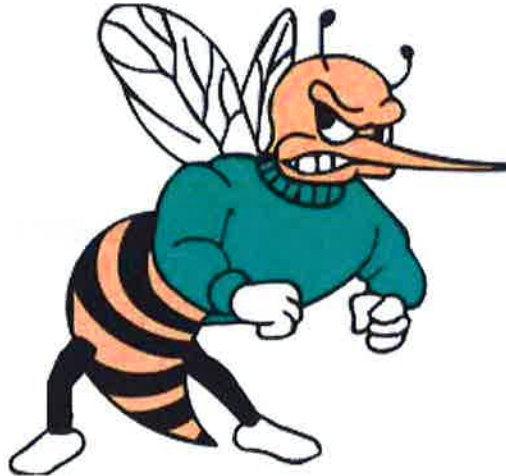
