REFERENDUM VOTE!!

The referendum vote takes place on November 8th, 2022. Tuesday, November 1st, 2022. Dr. Gary Albrecht will be available in the school library from 6:00 PM - 7:00 PM for information and questions regarding the November 8th, 2022 referendum. IMPORTANT HIGHLIGHTS FOR THE REGARDING THE REFERENDUM

- 2022-2023 open enrollment numbers into the district have increased this year and exceed the number of students enrolling out.
- Small class sizes with student opportunities in academics, athletics, and organizations.
- Current projections show an average tax rate (mill) of \$12.41 over the 4 years. (Previous 3 year targeted a \$12.71 tax rate.)
- Maintain the building so it is dry, warm, and conducive to learning.
- This 3 year referendum is necessary to maintain current school operations.

OPERATING AND PROJECTS COSTS/FUNDING

Operational costs: The referendum will allow the district enough funding for regular school operations (e.g. supplies, staffing, utilities) to operate through the 2025-26 school year. The referendum funding expires after the 2025-26 school year.

New Windows: \$450,000 The new windows (Summer of 2023) will be paid for by one-time Federal ESSER (pandemic) money that cannot be applied to operating funds.

Exterior Siding: This project is scheduled to be completed in 2024 and will be paid for via the Fund 46 (Capital projects fund - not able to be used for operating costs). The siding is needed for the exterior masonry which is deteriorating and requires protection soon.

Roof Repairs: Remaining roof repairs (2024) will also be paid out of the Fund 46 project account that cannot be used for operating costs.

Boilers and controls: There is one 30+ year-old boiler that needs to be replaced along with digital controls (2022-23). Cost is \$350,000 and will be covered by the operating referendum.

How did halloween starts

THE ORIGIN OF HALLOWEEN IS 3000
YEARS AGO

Halloween starts 3000 thousand years ago in the celtics towns of Europe they celebrated their new year called samhain.

Halloween is the contraction of All Hallow's Eve The pagan holiday was celebrated in Ireland on October 31, when the harvest season came to an end and the "Celtic New Year" began

What is Halloween nowadays

Nowadays halloween is a tradition in which children usually dress up and go through the streets knocking on people's doors asking for candy if they say the phrase: trick or treat.

History of Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is celebrated on the 24th of each November and has all sorts of food at the dinner table. Thanksgiving originated back in 1621, when the Pilgrims sailed the Mayflower in order to leave the kingdom of England. The trip started off with them leaving with 102 passengers. Nearly half of the passengers died during the voyage during the first winter. On November 11, 1620, the mayflower landed in Cape Cod, Massachusetts.

The day of Thanksgiving is celebrated with food, parades and football games. Parades normally happen in the mornings, football is in the afternoon and food gets started mid morning and is ready by late afternoon, early evening. This year there are 6 teams playing for the Thanksgiving holiday. The food varies from turkey being fried, boiled, or roasted, chicken being added to the table, all sorts of deserts, cranberry sauce and stuffing. Over the years more and more food has been added.

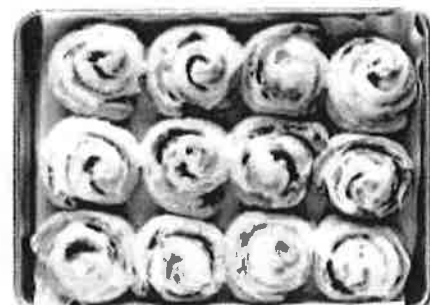
During the years, traditions have changed a lot. It went from people and families being thankful for things to people just sitting and eating at the table or in front of the TV. It has also changed from being celebrated for a week long to being just one day. Before thanksgiving changed, there weren't any holiday decorations on the tables or hardly any decorations at all.



National Cinnamon Roll Day!



October 3rd was National Cinnamon Roll day!!! Many that recognize this day will gather together and make cinnamon rolls, so here is a famous recipe for cinnamon rolls!



Ingredients

Rolls:

- 2 and $\frac{3}{4}$ cups of **all purpose flour**
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of **granulated sugar**
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of **salt**
- 2 and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoons of **Yeast (any instant packet (1))**
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of **whole milk**
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of **water (or more milk)**
- 3 tablespoons of **unsalted butter**
- 1 large **egg**

Filling:

- 3 tablespoons of **unsalted butter (softened)**
- 1 tablespoon of **ground cinnamon**
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of **granulated sugar or packed brown sugar**

Icing:

- 1 cup of **confectioners sugar**
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of **pure vanilla extract**
- 2-3 tablespoons of **brewed milk or Coffee**

Bake the rolls: After they double the size, preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Bake for 25-28 min. until lightly browned.

Make the icing:

Whisk confectioners sugar, vanilla, and coffee/milk together. Drizzle or spread over the warm rolls. Lastly, cover the leftover frosted or unfrosted rolls and store for up to 5 days in the fridge.

Instructions

Make the dough:

1. Whisk the flour, sugar, salt, and yeast in a large mixing bowl. Set aside.
2. Combine the milk, water and butter together in a bowl. Microwave or use the stove and heat until the butter is melted and the mixture is warm to touch. Pour dry ingredients, add the egg, and stir until it forms a soft dough.
3. On a lightly floured surface, knead dough for three min. In a lightly greased bowl, lightly covered, let rest for about ten min.

Fill the rolls:

1. After 10 min, roll the dough out and spread butter on top. Mix the cinnamon and sugar together and sprinkle on dough. Roll up tightly to make a 14 inch log. Cut into 10-12 even rolls, and arrange in a lightly greased 9 inch pan. Then tightly wrap the pan with the rolls with aluminum foil.

NATIONAL YORKSHIRE PUDDING DAY | OCTOBER 13

RECIPE



Ready in **50 minutes**

Yield: **12 puddings**

Ingredients

- 3 large eggs
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup / 165 grams whole milk
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup / 115 grams all-purpose flour
- $\frac{3}{4}$ teaspoon / 5 grams kosher salt

History

Yorkshire pudding dates back at least to the 1700s, when it was described as “Dripping Pudding” in *The Whole Duty of a Woman*. Cooks in the 18th century roasted meat on a spit over the flames in the kitchen fireplace, where it dripped as it cooked.

Preparation

1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. In a medium bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, flour and salt. Do not overmix. Allow the batter to rest 30 minutes at room temperature.
2. Add a teaspoon of fat to each cup of a 12-cup muffin tin and transfer to the oven to heat, about 5 to 7 minutes. Once hot, divide batter equally to fill the cups about halfway, and return the muffin tin for 10 to 12 minutes, or until the puddings are golden brown and crisp. Serve immediately

Tips

1. Choose the right fat
2. Let your batter rest

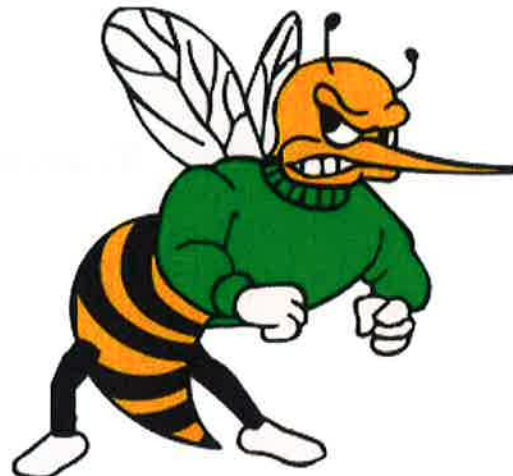
