WAUZEKA EARNS HIGH SCORES ON STATE REPORT CARDS

State report cards are published annually through the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and are issued based on four priority areas: student achievement in reading and mathematics on statewide assessments, (b) student growth in those areas, (c) target group outcomes for low-performing student populations, and (d) measures of readiness for graduation and postsecondary success.

Each year all schools (e.g. elementary, middle, high) and districts are given a star rating by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) and this year the Wauzeka-Steuben School District and each of the individual schools in the district earned 4 or 5 stars (5 is the highest rating). Following are the ratings by grade-level groups and the district overall:

K4-5 Four Stars - Exceeds Expectations

6-8 Four Stars - Exceeds Expectations

9-12 Five Starts - Significantly Exceeds Expectations

Wauzeka-Steuben School District - Four Stars - Exceeds Expectations

The Wauzeka-Steuben District Report card was best among conference schools and also tops among the 32 regional CESA 3 school districts.

The District Principal Tiffany Dums offered her perspective on the school report card results: "It is our amazing staff. They are working hard for each student in their classroom to provide the best outcome for each child individually. We do not only focus on "the test" we focus on the whole child. We love to celebrate all of our accomplishments and achievements; however, we know there is no ceiling. Everything is always changing as will we."

Interim District Administrator Gary Albrecht shared. "While we are very pleased at the results of our recent school report card and recognize the quality work of our staff, we continue the challenge of facing improvement in various areas of our school - including areas that are not tested."

DPI urges caution when interpreting scores and ratings due to impacts resulting from the pandemic. Additionally, while school and district report cards provide information to the community, they do not represent a full picture of the work happening in any school or district.

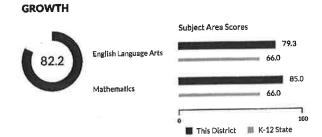
PRIORITY AREA WEIGHTS



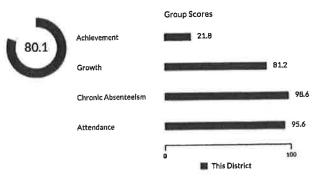

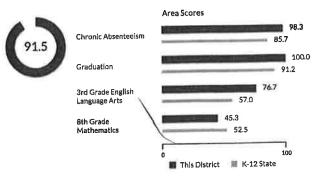

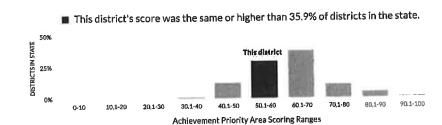

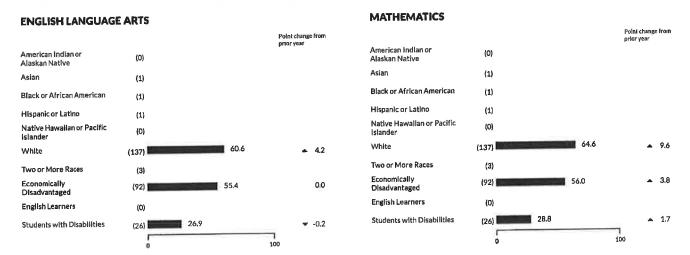


English Language Arts Score: 56.2 Mathematics Score: 58.6



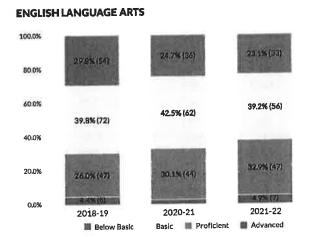

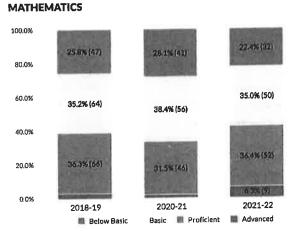

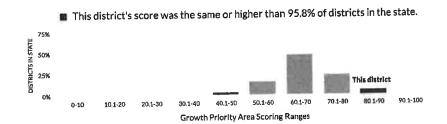
GROWTH

This priority area measures year-to-year student progress on statewide tests. It uses a value-added model that seeks to control for circumstances beyond the influence of educators. A high value-added score means that on average students in the district are progressing more quickly than other, similar students. Growth is scored from 0 to 100 to match the other priority areas and is a conversion from the roughly 0 to 6 value-added score.

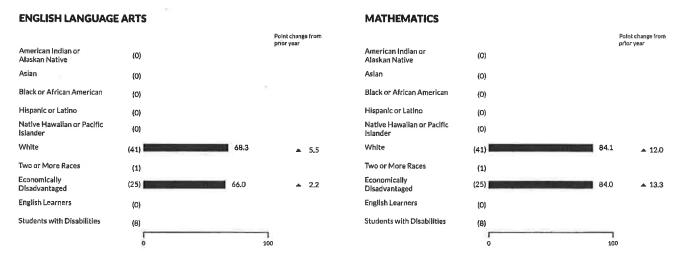

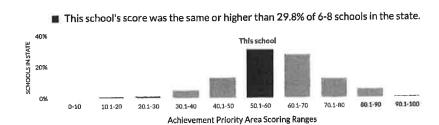

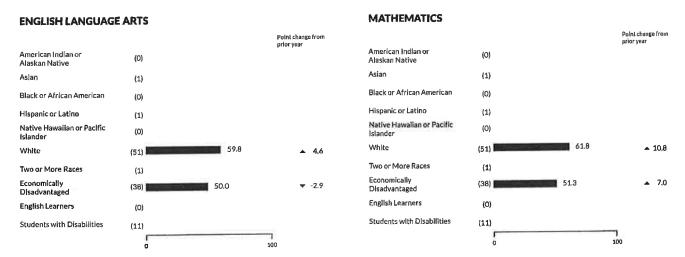

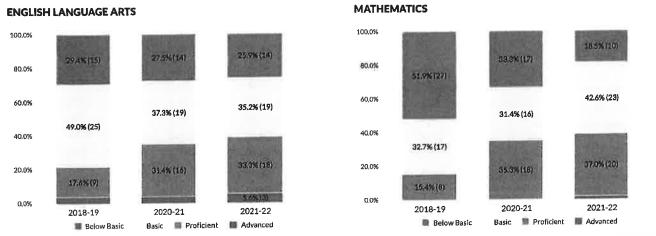

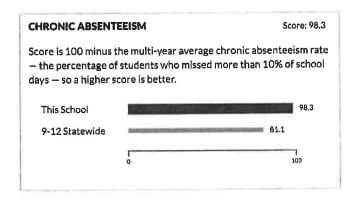

Classic Cheese Balls Recipe

Your new favorite New Years party appetizer!

Ingredients-

- Two 8-ounce blocks cream cheese, at room temperature
- 8 ounces mild cheddar cheese, grated (about 2 cups)
- 8 ounces swiss cheese, shredded (
 about 2 cups)
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- ½ teaspoon of black pepper

Coating Options-

- 1 cup minced fresh parsley
- 2 tablespoons freshly cracked black pepper
- ¼ cup toasted sesame seeds
- 1 cup walnuts, toasted and finely chopped

instructions-

- 1. To make the cheese balls: In a large bowl, combine the cream cheese, Cheddar, swiss, garlic, and pepper and mix well. Form the mixture into 2 cheese balls.
- 2. Choose one or two of the coating options. Place the coating in a shallow bowl and roll the balls to cover them well.
- 3. Wrap the balls individually in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 4 hours or up to overnight to let the flavors blend. Let the cheese balls sit out at room temperature for 1 hour before serving.
- 4. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for 3 to 5 days.

Today most people start their festivities on December 31(New Year's eve), the last day of the Gregorian calendar, and continue into the early hours of January 1(New Year's Day).

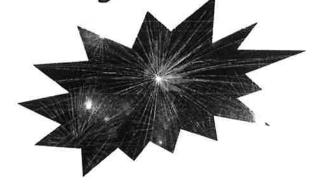
Traditions on this day!
