COLLEGE CAMPUS VISITS TO MADISON & GREEN BAY

On October 29, 2019, the Wauzeka-Steuben high school students chose between two colleges to tour for our annual college visit. Half of the student body visited Edgewood College and UW-Madison, located in Madison, WI., while the other half visited Northeast Technical College and UW-Green Bay, located in Green Bay, WI.



For the Madison trip, the students and their chaperones left Wauzeka around 7:30 AM, with Edgewood being the first stop. Edgewood is a private college that is small in numbers and big in reputation. Edgewood offered a tour to the students, breaking them into groups of five. Each program that is offered was explained to the students while entering the buildings that each program's classes take place in. The tour guides also showed the students what an average class size was, being under 20 students. The visit at Edgewood was concluded with pizza for lunch in one of the college's conference rooms.

After lunch, the students loaded the bus and began to travel to their next stop: UW-Madison. A few students chose to take the agricultural-focused tour (which left first), rather than the general tour, offering yet another opportunity. Then the general tour guide arrived, taking the students on an exploration of the large and diverse campus. Immediately, everyone in attendance was able to sense exactly how large scale the UW-Madison campus really is. The day came to an end, and the students once again loaded the bus to begin traveling back to Wauzeka, arriving home around 3:50PM.

For the northeastern Wisconsin trip, the students and chaperones had an early morning (6:00 AM) due to the four hour long bus ride. The first stop for the students attending the trip was UW-Green Bay. UW-Green Bay is one of the largest colleges in the urban area, attracting many students every school year. They showed students where classes took place, what classes were in session, the classes offered and student life around the dorms. With everyone in

After an hour tour and sit-in with the NETC students, they loaded the bus, traveled back to Wauzeka and arrived back home around 7:30 PM.

This year's cross country season was another great and historic performance. Though the girls could not qualify and compete as a "team" (a "team" is considered no less than five runners), the girls placed well individually. At the conference race, juniors Lizzie Udelhoven led Wauzeka with a 25th place run,



Maureen Cooley followed in 31st and Regan Kramer placed 35th. Freshman Grace Zinkle notched a 44th place finish.

The boys' team was led by seniors Jake Reichmann and Christopher Reising, winning their third straight conference title. The boys then went on to the Division III sectional race in Boscobel, Wisconsin, where they finished sixth out of twenty-two teams. Notable finishers were: Jake Reichmann (4th), Zach Martin (42nd) and Reed Stenner (49th).

Reichmann's fourth place finish qualified him to run in the state meet for the third year in a row. The race took place in Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, the following weekend. Reichmann's race was the last of the day; he performed very well with a 32nd place finish out of 149 of the best runners in Division III.

Along with Reichmann's state qualification, he was also named the conference's "Runner of the Year" for the second straight year, while Coach Ben Dums was voted as the conference's "Coach of the Year." Jake Reichman was awarded first team All-Conference honors, alongside junior Zach Martin. Senior Christopher Reising, junior Reed Stenner and sophomore Isaac Reichmann received much deserved recognition and were voted as runners for the conference's second team All-Conference roster. Being acknowledged as a member of the conference's "Sportsmanship Team" is a special accomplishment; Wauzeka-Steuben's juniors Regan Kramer and Zach Martin represented the team, school and district well, being named as runners to this squad.

Any monetary donation up to a cumulative level of \$25,000 will be matched dollar for dollar by a 1976 alumnus.

Many of the alumni from Wauzeka-Steuben High School have leveraged their WSHS education to become successful employees, entrepreneurs, and community leaders. The recently established Alumni Scholarship was initiated by a 1976 WSHS alumnus, and is intended to encourage academic excellence and additional post-high school education by helping defer tuition and related educational expenses at a four-year college for an outstanding graduating WSHS senior. The scholarship is intended to be one of the premiere WSHS scholarships awarded to a graduating senior, with a current stipend level of \$2,000 payable near the time of the 1st semester college enrollment. Selection is based primarily on high school GPA, active participation in WSHS extracurricular activities, and college standardized admission tests such as ACT or SAT, thereby demonstrating considerable promise for academic success in college.

In order to provide long-term financial stability for the Alumni Scholarship, an endowment fund with a goal of \$50,000 is being set up. Any WSHS alumni or benefactor donation up to a cumulative level of \$25,000 will be matched dollar for dollar by the 1976 alumnus. All WSHS alumni and friends are encouraged to consider making a donation to help achieve the endowment goal for this scholarship.

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


